

Chengjiang Fossil Site, People's Republic of China

Facts

- Recommended by IUCN for inscription on the World Heritage List in June 2012 at the World Heritage Committee in Saint Petersburg, Russia, as it is one of the most important palaentological sites in the world and conserves many fossil remains of exceptional significance.
- These fossils are of great scientific importance, as they give valuable insight about the early Cambrian period (530 million years ago), a key period of rapid diversification of species and evolutionary development of life on Earth.
- The exceptional paleontological record of rare anatomical detail and beauty includes fossils from 152 different species. Many of these species, especially the soft-bodied ones, are unique to this fossil site.
- The Chengjiang site is located in the Yunnan Province of China in the villages of Ercaicun and Chengjiang near the city of Kunming.
